# **Monthly Meeting Talks**

Our speaker in February was Chris Coates, one of our members, who has given us talks in the past. Her subject was the history of the Preston Road going back several centuries and bringing us up to the present day. It was thoroughly researched and excellently presented which made it a very enjoyable experience. Then in March we welcomed Rachel Montagu who came highly recommended and understandably so. She

talked about 'Operation Mincemeat', which was a strategic plan in World War 2 designed to confuse the Germans. It did just that and subsequently altered the course of the war. What made it so good was that Rachel's grandfather and family were very much involved in the whole operation. She had high quality slides of her family and made the whole event "come alive".

Our next meeting is on **23 April** - St. George's Day – at 10am when our speaker will be Howard Slater. The title of his talk will be *East End of London - From the Huguenots to the Bengalis*.

## **Exploring London Visits**

On 18 February, we went on a visit to the Florence Nightingale Museum. The curator took us on a fascinating tour where we learned lots about Florence Nightingale's life and work, spanning well beyond the Lady with the Lamp story we all knew. We also got the opportunity to look round ourselves at some interesting displays in a relatively recently refurbished museum. Many of us lingered over refreshments in the St Thomas' Hospital café.



On 25 March, our very own City of London & St Paul's Cathedral Guide, Diana O'Reardon, took 25 of us on a fascinating guided tour of St Paul's Cathedral, with her huge knowledge (and voice projection and crowd control skills!) evident. She told us about the Cathedral's history and showed us the rich architectural and artefact highlights in the Cathedral and the crypt. See group picture on page 1.

On the morning of **Monday 7 April**, we are going on a guided tour of the grand **Spencer House in St James's**. That visit is fully booked.

Please contact Louise Bennett if you would like to go on her next visit. On the morning of **Friday 9 May** we are heading to the **Battle of Britain Bunker at Uxbridge.** Our expert guide will meet us at the new Visitors Centre and take us down the 76 steps (which you obviously need to be fit enough to walk confidently down and up) to the historic, top-secret Operations Room that was in use throughout the Second World War. The guide will talk us through the crucial part the Bunker and its staff played during the Battle of Britain and beyond. The whole tour lasts approximately 60 minutes We



can then explore the 'Controllers Cabins' at our leisure before making our way up to the surface and the gift shop and café. The Bunker is a mile from Uxbridge Station. As well as the usual option of going by train and then walking, Louise will be organising car sharing among those who sign up. The cost is £15 each.


#### **Art History**

Our course on Female Artists pre 1800 is sadly ending on 4 April. Over the course of two terms, Jennifer Mills has skilfully and engagingly provided us with encounters with some remarkable women from across Europe, working in many different genres. The final session on 4 April is for members to present paintings by post 1800 artists. Jennifer returns on Friday 3 October with a new series of classes, this time on **The Spanish Golden Age 1550-1700**.



#### **Morality Matters**

At the March Meeting, Jack Friend presented the question *Are we being strangled by our traditional values and freedoms? We had a* well-attended meeting and a lively debate. On Wednesday 2 April at



2pm Geoffrey Ben-Nathan will ask *How should we lead our later* years: Should we relax and take it easy, or should we still strive to change the world? His question comes from his study of Epicurus (341–270 BCE) the ancient Greek philosopher and founder of a school of thought that emphasized the pursuit of pleasure and the avoidance of pain as the keys to a happy life. While this may suit some people, others feel that their life is not fulfilled unless they continue to strive for whatever they perceive as their ideals. For the meeting on Wednesday 7 May Herbie Goldberg will be in the chair asking *To what extent, if any, should the rich nations of the world be responsible for relieving the poverty of the poor nations?*

#### **Knitting**



#### **Monthly Rambles**



Frances Saunders led our ramble on Friday 28
February. The 5-mile walk in glorious sunshine took us from Tower Hill to Victoria Park, along the Thames to St Katherine's Dock, Shadwell Old Basin and Limehouse Basin. We then followed the Regent Canal to Victoria Park for lunch in the Hub café before heading home.

The Monday 31 March ramble saw Louise leading 11 of us on a 5.3 mile circular walk from Hammersmith Station along the south bank towpath of the River Thames and into Barnes Common and historic Barnes village with a café lunch in Barnes.

Adeline Geary will lead the ramble on **Wednesday 30 April** This time it is a 5-mile linear walk along the Thames Path, dipping into Battersea Park. We will be **starting at Wandsworth Town Rail Station and finishing at Vauxhall Bridge**. Surfaced paths throughout. Further details, including travel and lunch arrangements will be issued to those on the ramblers group mailing list. Please let Louise know if you would like to come or to join the email list so you are alerted to future walks. This group's walks are relatively energetic. Stout footwear is essential and reasonable fitness is assumed. Rambles take place on different weekdays rather than being on a set day.

#### **Monthly Walks**

On Sunday 16 March Kevin led a walk in Hoxton and Shoreditch exploring some of the oldest parts of London. Curtain Street was the centre of the London furniture making from the 19<sup>th</sup> to the mid -20<sup>th</sup> century. In 1576 James Burbage built The *Theatre* and a rival theatre the Curtain was built a year later. Artists Damien Hirst and Tracey Emin worked from studios around Shoreditch. Hoxton Square was laid out in 1683. Ben Johnston, a contemporary of Shakespeare, killed a fellow actor in a duel in 1598 here. Number 1 has a blue plaque commemorating James Parkinson who first identified 'the shaking palsy'-



Parkinson's disease. A music hall stood here from the 1870s until demolished in the 1980s. Hoxton Street has a connection to the Gunpowder Plot as Lord Monteagle's house stood here. It was he who informed the government of an anonymous letter warning of the plot to assassinate James I. The Geffrye Museum and the Columbia Street Flower market are here. St Leonards is *The Bells of Shoreditch* in the nursery rhyme *Oranges and Lemons*. Richard Burbage, theatre manager, is buried here with the epitaph 'Exit Burbage.' Christopher Marlowe had a home in Norton Folgate an area notorious for criminality. We ended the walk at Liverpool Street Station.

Kevin's next walk is on Sunday 27 April and will focus on Primrose Hill. Please register with Kevin to come on the walks and get joining details for the next walk.

#### **Classical Music Appreciation**


In March we examined Tchaikovsky's operas, particularly Eugene Onegin, with its plot revolving around a woman's being spurned by the hero, his regret and then his being spurned by her – with lots of dramatic action between those two events. This preceded a showing of a complete performance for our opera group later in the month.

Thursday April 10's session at 2pm will be devoted to Samuel Barber, an outstanding 20<sup>th</sup> century American composer. Herbie tells us that Barber was, for a long time, a one-hit wonder; the moving and elegiac *Adagio for* 



Strings has been played frequently on solemn occasions. But in recent years, his other works have gained more attention. Avant-garde modernism had no place in his music – his works are often richly melodious, dramatic and emotional. Though successful in his early life, Barber encountered disappointments in his latter years – all will be revealed. On 8 May, we will be looking at the story of Gilbert and Sullivan. With fourteen comic operas in 25 years, theirs was the most enduring collaboration between a writer and composer – but their professional relationship was fraught with squabbles, jealousy and thwarted ambitions. The story of their roller-coaster careers will, of course, be illustrated with excerpts from their operas.

#### **Film Review Club**



We have finished our series of three films directed by Mel Brooks and starring Gene Wilder. Ruth Levere, who organises these afternoons, says 'I think it would be fair to say that all three films, *Young Frankenstein, The Producers* and *Blazing Saddles* met with a mixed reception with some members really enjoying them while others found them distinctly unfunny. They all provoked a good deal of discussion about being at least in part in bad taste and containing language and ideas that are not acceptable in films today. The **17 April** film is very different. We will be watching *Amadeus* (1984) based on the stage play by Peter Shaffer. It describes a rivalry between two 18th century composers, Mozart and Antonio Salieri and has a wonderful Mozart score. The running time is 161 minutes so be prepared for an enjoyable afternoon. Following Amadeus, we will have a season of Woody Allen films including *Annie Hall*, *Love and Death* and *Midnight in Paris*.' All film shows are on the third Thursday afternoon of the

month at 1.30pm and include refreshments followed by a discussion.

#### Rummikub & Scrabble and BRIDGE

The Rummikub and Scrabble Group sessions now include those from the BEGINNERS' Bridge class who want to put into practice, in a relaxed manner, what has been demonstrated in the teaching sessions. Please bring playing cards! Bridge mentors welcome. Our sessions start at 10am, in the bar lounge, on the first Tuesday and third Wednesday of each month. Any no-longerneeded sets of Rummikub and/or Scrabble and/or Playing cards would be a welcome

#### **Book Club**

We met on 27 February and had a most enjoyable afternoon discussing the merits of Sarah Winman's 4 books. Most of us agreed, with some dissension, that her work is interesting and worth reading. We identified some common themes such as people (without the ties of blood) forming family units, men nurturing children and love in all its positive and sometime negative variations. Her last book, *Still Life*, received a very positive response from everyone who read it. We are meeting again on Thursday **24 April** at 2pm and our chosen author is **Elif Shafak.** The Financial Times described Shafak as "Turkey's leading female novelist". To date she has published over 20 books which have been translated into 57 languages. The group chooses an author rather than a specific book for our considerations. You are very welcome to join us – just let Zsuzsanna Messing know.



#### Cookery



The group numbers 13 but, as Viv can only accommodate ten, we sometimes have to operate a rota to make sure everyone gets at least one session a month. As not everyone can make every session, it usually works out well. We meet at 10.30am on the 2nd and 4th Thursday of the month and after tea/coffee and the reading of the recipes, a two-course lunch is cooked which we later share. In February the theme was "It's OK to cheat!" using ready-made ingredients like precooked rice and ready rolled pastry. In March we cooked recipes suitable for Easter/ Spring including turkey, salmon and chocolate. In April we will be using "Pork" as our main ingredient and making cakes which will include fruits. One with apples and the other with new seasonal rhubarb.

#### **Magic of Musicals**



In February we read Alan Ayckbourn's *Confusions*, consisting of a series of five interconnected one-act plays loosely linked by characters or locations, but more subtly through the underlying themes of obsession, isolation and human desire for companionship. In March we read *The Wipers Times* by lan Hislop and Nick Newman based on the true wartime story. Both these plays were entertaining and enjoyable.

Our next play is going to be (a re-reading of) Oscar Wilde's *The Importance of Being Ernest*, which needs no explanation . Due to public

and private holidays, we only have one week available in April and one in May so half the group will come on 28 April and the other half on 19 May.
